On November 9th, we returned to the Hodson Bay Hotel in Athlone, accompanied by two musicians, a professional photographer, an art therapist, and two fantastic new volunteers from SMBC Aviation Capital – not to mention over eighty people from, joining together to remember their precious children. We were honoured to hear from mum Rebecca, dad Andrew, and sister Audrey, as they told their stories and reminded us that in speaking the names of those we have loved and lost, that love lives on. When Sarah and Ray sang "The Parting Glass," that vibrant love flowed as tears met raised voices. For all who came, thank you for your vulnerability, kindness toward each other, and bravery in showing up to each new day.

Then, on Sunday, 16th November, families and friends gathered in the Meadowlands Hotel in Tralee for our Munster Remembrance Day. Led by Dee Regan from the Anam Cara Service Team, and Cora O'Brien – facilitator of our Kerry parents support group—the event offered a gentle and supportive space for connection, reflection, and the honouring of children who are no longer with us. In a heartfelt candle-lighting ceremony, individual candles were lit by parents from our Tipperary and Kerry parents' groups, each flame representing a cherished life remembered with love. SERVICES UPDATE

Since our last newsletter, our service team has been hard at work reaching out to new families and communities. We were delighted to host in-person Bereavement Information sessions in collaboration with Firstlight in Donegal. Expanding our core services to all corners of the island is essential to our mission of ensuring no parent has to grieve alone.

In addition to the family gatherings for our two Remembrance Days, we had some of our most successful Bereavement Information Evenings to date, with one parent writing:

"We found tonight's talk extremely helpful. It has given us a greater insight to our grieving. We have discovered that how we feel is normal & can take the information we learned tonight to help us on our ongoing journey through loss.

For frontline professionals, we were able to host two training workshops with qualifying continuing education hours, bringing up to date, relevant, and evidencebased resources to all careers that encounter bereaved parents. From Gardaí and paramedics to family support workers and teachers, making sure the community is aware of how to support grieving parents and the resources that are available is a vital part of our work. Many professionals don't know where to direct parents in the weeks, month, and years following the death of a child. These workshops help us ensure professionals know where to turn, and no parent has to grieve alone.
